FEBRUARY MISSION OF THE MONTH-TAKE A BITE OUT OF HUNGER

The Serve Team has designated Bread of Life Community Services, the Commerce Food Pantry and the Lion Food Pantry as February's Mission of the Month and is coordinating several events to raise awareness and funds to take a bite out of hunger in Commerce. On February 12, Super Bowl Sunday, we will host a soup lunch after worship for the Souper Bowl of Caring. The Serve and Connect Teams will supply crock pots of savory soups and invite members to bring sides like crackers and desserts. A large soup pot will be available for love offerings.


The **Commerce Food Pantry**, open from 2-4 p.m. each Thursday is housed at the Presbyterian church on Monroe Street. Neighbors may visit the pantry once each calendar month. Volunteers prepare basic boxes, and then clients select frozen proteins, beverages, and hygiene items to be added. Boxes are then delivered to waiting cars. According to pantry manager Angela Roberts, 467 different families visited the pantry in 2022, with 10% coming 10 or more times a year and 71% coming four or fewer times. The pantry relies on the North Texas Food Bank, Hunt Regional Healthcare (A grant from a settlement with the tobacco industry funds non-food items), and Brookshire's Grocery Store and is grateful for the donations from area churches and civic clubs.

Bread of Life Community Services operates out of Bread of Life Church of the Nazarene on Highway 24. Director Lesley Lay reports that between 200-240 households receive boxes of canned goods, cereal, milk, eggs, chicken, pork and sweets. They operate on the 3rd Wednesday evening of the month or the first Monday after the first Wednesday of the month from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Individuals 60 or over may receive an extra box of commodities at the same time. Boxes can also be delivered to homes if the person doesn't have transportation. To qualify for the boxes, one needs to show a picture ID and provide a document that confirms their address. Community Services also keeps on hand Blessing Boxes for those suffering an emergency such as a house fire. Bread of Life Community Services is the beneficiary of the North Texas Food Bank, Hunt Regional Healthcare, Wal-Mart and private donors like the Anderson Group.

Less well-known is the Lion Food Pantry located in the Halladay Student Services building on the TAMU-C campus. Director Nikki Barnett reports that any TAMU-Commerce student may visit the pantry once a week. Over 1,200 students visited the pantry in 2022.

When one hears the term, "food insecurity," we don't often think of college students. Forbes Magazine reports that 40% of all college students have experienced food insecurity. Seventy percent of students of color, including Native Americans, experience food insecurity. Twenty percent of Commerce Food Pantry clients are college students.

Unlike the other two food resources, the Lion Food Pantry relies SOLELY on donations to stock its shelves. To replenish supplies. FUMC will partner with the Pantry to collect canned soups and chili on Saturday, February 11, in front of Mugs from 11a.m.to 1pm.



- 1. You can pray for those experiencing food insecurity.
- 2. You can drop dollar bills or a check with "food insecurity" in the memo line during February worship. If you give online, click on the Mission of the Month button.
- 3. You can drive by Mugs on Saturday, February 11th, and drop off cans of soup and chili.
- 4. You can volunteer to accept the canned soups and chili on that Saturday with university volunteers.
- 5. You can attend the Souper Bowl of Caring soup lunch after worship on February 12th and drop a love offering in the soup pot. Proceeds from drop a dollar and the love offering will be divided between Bread of Life Community Services and the Commerce Food Pantry. All canned soups and chili will benefit the Lion Food Pantry.

Mother Teresa once said, "If you can't help 100 people, help 1." Our efforts may not eradicate hunger in Commerce completely, but we CAN reduce hunger here.

January has flown by and February will be underway as you get this. warmer, we will plan an event which will be an opportunity for us to meet the Blessing Table clients in person.

Our Connect, Grow, and Serve Teams are doing well with their planning of events and discerning where our focus should be to fulfill our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ. I have the bright idea to add a Worship element to the Grow Team, since worship is an integral part of our spiritual growth. If you are interested in serving on the Worship Team as part of the Grow Team, please let me know by text or email. I'll let you know when the next meeting will be.

And just because we have a Connect Team, Grow Team, and Serve Team does not mean anyone is limited in where they serve. These are not elected

positions in the church. They are simply a way we can use our specific gifts to serve the church's vision faithfully. Speaking of spiritual gifts, here's an assessment you can use to help define where
